


## Deputy Report

Focus on Technology - Year 11
Year 11 students readily adapted to using their Google Classroom to consolidate and strengthen their mathematical skills. Our brilliant maths teachers spent hours creating and recording themselves delivering content in a non-traditional classroom environment. Year 11 students successfully completed their first online assessment task during the "Learning from Home" period, with only a few glitches in uploading their work. The use of technology is integral in student learning, with the use of online web-based programs such as GeoGebra and Desmos aiding in making the transition from pen and paper graphing to utilising

Examples of the use of technology in Year 11 are included below:

#### Modelling Activity- The Sydney Harbour Bridge

technology.

The arch of the Sydney Harbour Bridge is constructed of two parabolas. This type of bridge is called a 'through arch bridge' because the base of the arch is embedded into the ground and the deck (road) actually goes through part of the arch. The central part of the deck is suspended from the arch.

## 2) Mathematical report - "Females are better drivers"

Students were required to investigate this statement and produce a report that justified their answer (with mathematical reasoning). To assist the student, source material from the Australian Bureau of Statistics was provided as well as a set of scaffolded activities. The use of Excel spreadsheets is another key component of this report, particularly when representing data and using this to support their reasoning.

## 3) Investigation - "How are outdoor concert spaces designed?"

This investigation is based on the use of students' knowledge of Trigonometry. In the process of completing this investigation a master class was conducted by Ms Weston to demonstrate the ICT skills required. Students are expected to make use of a range of tools, including Google Maps, Desmos and/or GeoGebra to present a detailed explanation.





A big welcome back to school from the Learning and Support AND Teaching and Learning faculty!

It has been a very busy semester in the Learning and Support side of the faculty. The staff have spent a lot of time looking at different forms of data such as NAPLAN and Best Start to help develop lessons and tasks that suit the varying needs of the students at Bankstown Girls High School. But the best part of our term has been working with this year, we have welcomed six new International Students to our school as well as a cohort of Year 7 students who have settled into high school so well that we are not even sure we can still call them "new".

The Teaching and Learning side of the faculty has also had a busy start to the year. Year 7 have been involved in the Foundations for Learning program by looking at the Habits of Mind and reflecting on their learning styles and making plans to improve their learning in all subject areas. The Year 8 STEM program also started this semester- this year all Year 8 students are involved in the "What makes Bankstown Special?" guided inquiry/STEAM program that asks them to investigate the reasons why our community is special compared to other communities around the world, the program has so far been focussing on guided inquiry skills such as collaboration, research and questioning. 

6.If you were stranded on an island, what is something you'd wish for? Definitely my kindle. "What's that?" It's like an eBook app on my phone.




# YEAR 7 BBQ

Have you noticed black squares invading your screen on social media? People from around the world have bonded together to raise awareness of the *Black Lives Matter Movement*.

Black Lives Matter (BLM) is an international human rights movement, originating from within the African American community, which campaigns against violence and systemic racism towards black people. Black Lives Matter has always been more of a human rights movement rather than a civil rights movement. Its focus has been less about changing specific laws and more about changing society's beliefs and behaviours.

For a society which preaches peace and acceptance and celebrates differences, America sure has a high rate of police brutality and racial injustice. May 25 th , 2020: George Floyd was arrested for a minor offence which led to his death by police officers in Minneapolis, Minnesota. This incident achieved global interest, prompting worldwide protests, raising awareness about racism against Black people and the need to find a solution.

As support for this movement grows globally, protestors are taking aim at their own local racism and discrimination. The 6 th of June marked the day tens of thousands of Australians took to the streets to protest and raise awareness about Indigenous deaths in custody.

In Australia, incidents of Indigenous deaths by the hand of the State do not gain much international attention. The impacts of colonisation, oppression, contemporary systemic racism, and police brutality are global issues as prevalent in Australia as they are in the USA. One thing is for sure, both America and Australia have a long way to go in the fight at destroying racism.

### MYTH OR REALITY?




