Mathematics

As Term 4 draws to an end, the Mathematics staff would like to take this opportunity to wish all of our students and their families a very safe and restful summer vacation.

2022 has again allowed us to celebrate student achievement in all Mathematics and Numeracy classes. Students were publicly acknowledged for their academic excellence during Presentation Day. The prestigious annual *Australian Mathematics Competition* rewarded many students for their talents in the Australia wide event, with 95% of our students gaining a Credit level or achieving at a Proficiency level. Ms Kyritsis and Mrs Rounis worked with Stage 6 Retail Services students to incorporate numeracy skills within the Retail Services program. Just when the retail students thought that Mathematics no longer needed! The topics was covered included: purchasing items, cash handling, float and balances, interpreting invoices, discounts, mark ups, profit, loss, surcharges, GST and stocktake calculations, roster (interpretation and calculating), and pay slips.



Problem Solving and the Design Thinking Process was a focus for Stage 4 students in the Numeracy program. Students were tasked with constructing the tallest tower with a given set of material. Students worked meticulously to plan, design and test their towers to satisfy the constraints that were imposed by the teachers. A range of impressive towers were constructed whereby students relied on a solid base before attempting to build the tower vertically.



Human Society and its Environment

In Term 4, Year 9 HSIE have focused on the topic 'Environmental Change and Management'. As part of The Geography program a fieldwork excursion was organised to Centennial Parklands, where the students participated in activities that helped further develop their geographical skills. They enriched their learning through hands-on activities, such as testing PH levels, temperature, dissolved oxygen levels, turbidity, and nitrates, which they recorded in their booklets. Students worked in groups as they toured the park and the various ponds located within the area. They performed water quality surveys to assess stormwater quality in the Parklands' pond system, investigated pond management practices to determine their effectiveness, and different environmental looked at functions: source, sink, service, and spirituality and how they relate to the wetlands.

Along our journey, students saw various types of marine life like turtles and ducks. It was especially rare to spot an eel, as they don't usually come out during windy weather. The excursion was an enjoyable learning experience that consolidated the course work that has been taking place. What a great way to end the year!





This term, our Year 10 Commerce students took a trip to Luna Park Sydney to supplement their understanding of their topic the *Economic and Business Environment*. Students had the opportunity to gain first-hand experience of how Luna Park operates as a business within the Sydney Business Environment.

This excursion was an early start for our students as we made our way to North Sydney via train, taking in the sights of Sydney as we crossed over the Harbour Bridge. We then made our way to Luna Park, walking along the water before being greeted by the wonderful Robert who took us in for a business presentation. Our students were engaged in the presentation, asking and answering some great questions that the presenters were quite pleased with. We started with the history of Luna Park Sydney, how it has changed over the years, and how the business is run. Students were shown a variety of different business information including financial statements, marketing samples and given real issues that Luna Park experienced and overcome. This was very beneficial to students as they gained real-world experience about running a business, using Luna Park Sydney as the example.

Next, it was time for some rides!

After the presentation, students hurried off to jump on as many rides and play as many games as possible in the time that they had. Students had the opportunity to try out all the rides Luna Park Sydney had to offer. Year 10 got to experience a variety of rollercoasters, thrill rides and sideshow games, with the clear favourites being the Sledgehammer and the Big Dipper!





Our Year 10 Commerce students had a fantastic time and learnt a lot out from this experience! We would also like to commend our students' behaviour on the day and for conducting themselves in a manner befitting students from Bankstown Girls High School. Science

On the night of November 8th 2022, a total lunar eclipse, also referred to as a blood moon, took place over Australia and New Zealand. This phenomenon occurs when the Moon enters the Earth's shadow, and the Sun is perfectly aligned with the Earth and Moon. Although the Moon is covered by the Earth's shadow, some sunlight still manages to reach it. After the Sun's light passes through the Earth's atmosphere, the majority of the blue light gets scattered into the Earth's atmosphere and the red light will then pass through the atmosphere and eventually fall on the Moon, allowing it to appear red. This occurrence is called Rayleigh Scattering.



As a science student, I was given an exclusive opportunity to attend an enjoyable evening at the *Powerhouse Sydney Observatory* alongside Ms Edwards and Mr Golestan. There were many scientific talks, musical performances, and telescopes that were available for us to observe Saturn, Jupiter, and the Moon. The eclipse started at 9:16pm, peaked at 9:59pm, and ended at 10:41pm. The night was overall a spectacular experience and I'm sincerely grateful to have been able to attend such a rare night.

Later in the month of November, during the 14th and 18th, Year 10 work experience took place for a week, where all year 10s were absent from school to learn about different workplaces to allow them to have an insight as to what their future career could be and what it may look like on a day-to-day basis. I undertook my work experience in a nanophotonics research facility under TMOS (Transformative Meta-Optical Systems) at *University of Technology*, Sydney.

I had the opportunity to operate a \$2 million electron microscope called the Helios Hydra 5 plasma dual-beam Focused Ion Beam (FIB). I also observed a photoluminescence experiment in which we were aiming to find single photon emitters (SPEs) via a spectrometer, and I had many lab tours and handled many different electron microscopes and optical microscopes under the guidance of PhD students and candidates. I learnt what it was like to pursue physics research as a postgraduate and how to collect and analyse different data sets and graphs. I've also learnt that physics is an extremely broad and scientifically interesting subject, and all physics is related so no matter what you study, it'll be extremely enjoyable. This experience was truly one of a kind and unforgettable, thank you Mr Golestan for making it happen.

Our team members actively participate and always enjoy learning new things about our natural environment and why we cannot stress enough about keeping our Earth safe and clean for future generations. Being part of the Environmental team also opens



the door of new learning experiences and benefits to our members to be more active and useful citizens.

Wattle Space Project 2021-2022

Earlier in the year, our team participated in the NASA Earth and space wattle project. The project was called a controlled experiment comparing Wattle Seeds kept in space for six months and Earth wattle seeds. We watered the seeds every few days and compared the survival rate and longevity of each group of seeds. Unfortunately, the space seeds died and only Earth seeds survived the longest. The surviving wattle plants are ready to be planted in the school. It was a good learning experience most of our girls will never forget.

Excursions and opportunities

Being in the Environmental team has its benefits! Not only do you play an important role in our school, you are also rewarded with fun excursions. Our most recent excursion was on the 6th of December, where Mrs El-Haddad took the whole Environmental team to the Royal Botanic

Gardens, Sydney to complete fun activities whilst observing and learning about the beautiful flora (plants) that has been collected from across the world and different regions since it was established in 1816 . Ranging from Herbs to Cacti, there were many different and unique varieties of flora throughout the massive garden. Truly, it was a fun and exciting day for our entire team. Our past Environmental leaders, Quynh and Cherrie joined us and spoke to us about their university study and passion, the good time they spent at our school and as leaders of the environmental team. By completing the worksheets, our students were able to learn about
