As we approach the end of the term, I would like to thank everyone for the hard work they have put in to help the girls get through a challenging beginning to the year. This term, Year 7 and 9 participated in preparations for the 2022 NAPLAN by undertaking the two practice tests. It was pleasing to see the girls taking the practice tests seriously and trying their best to understand the sort of test they would be facing. There were two practice tests for the girls to attempt, with the first being a writing test, where the girls were given a topic to write about, and the second was an omnibus test. The omnibus was a combination of the types of questions the girls will get in reading. language conventions numeracy tests. The NAPLAN test will run from 10th May to 20th May. Earlier this term an information package was sent

Mathematics

The Mathematics faculty welcomed back our dedicated staff; Mrs Rounis, Mr Mustapha, Mr Yilmazlar, Ms Doai, Ms Weston and Miss Wang with Mrs Newman joining our team.



We launched our in-class support with Mrs Saisanas, Ms Doai, Mrs Newman and Miss Wang, as well as our lunchtime tutoring sessions. Additionally, our Mathletics program has also commenced, and we encourage students to take advantage of the additional support provided by this online resource.

The 'Numeracy in Mathematics' program with Weston commenced students working on graphs and tables using the S.T.A.R.T cards in Year 7 and a problem-solving unit exploring working mathematically component of the course in Year 8. Continuing the numeracy theme, Mrs Rounis has been working with Ms Kyritsis and the HSIE teachers in History, Commerce Geography. Mrs Singh has taken on board the numeracy role in Science. programs are providing students with the necessary skills to apply mathematics in the context of Science and HSIE.

Our Year 9 STEAM program commenced with Ms Doai and Mr Mohan focusing on skilling our students in robotics. We envisage that several groups of students will have the opportunity to take part in the URC Robotics challenge at the end of the year, which we have been a part of since its inauguration in 2019 with BGHS representing Australia in Japan.

Year 7 students completed the Best Start assessment, while Year 8 students completed the Check-In assessment. Both assessments provided us with valuable data focusing on areas of mathematical strengths and concepts that require additional support.

In Mathematics, we try to extend our students to be creative in solving problems and produce high quality work. In Year 7, students explored, researched, and created new number systems. Students named their number system and provided detailed explanations of how their number system operated. Eiliyah El-Jammal created "The Sushi" which can be seen below.



In Year 10, students were challenged by working with compound interest, buying items on terms, and justifying their choice of purchasing. Meanwhile, Year 12 students were immersed in their investigative tasks in all three courses. The Standard course students explored networks and their implications, while the Advanced course put into practice their statistical skills. The Extension 1 class had to develop a drinking capsule given a set of constraints.

The Mathematics faculty has a range of activities planned for our students to support their learning. The most vital aspect in the study of mathematics is how and when to apply skills in context. The problem-solving component of working mathematically remains a focus for our practice, providing students with realworld examples of mathematics in action. Numeracy days organised by the faculty will run in the next couple of terms and have proven to be a huge success in the past. Students will be supported in their NAPLAN preparation in Year 7 and 9, as will Year 10 for their HSC Minimum Standards.

Science

The Science faculty is so happy to be welcoming our wonderful students back to the laboratory. It is fantastic to be back!

2022 has commenced with our first HSC Physics class since 2016. During this same period, the number of senior science classes (Biology, Chemistry, Physics, and Investigating Science) has grown from four classes in 2016 to ten classes in 2022.

We also welcome a new member of staff this year, Mrs Anjum Newman. Mrs Newman comes with a swathe of experience in teaching both science and mathematics. She has fitted in perfectly to our faculty and we are lucky to have her at Bankstown Girls.

Our Physics teacher, Mr Golestan, is the new Year 7 Advisor. During his address to his new cohort, he made the following analogy, "Would an avocado seed thrown in the middle of Chapel St make roots and grow? (students called out 'no') An avocado needs a variety of nutrients from the soil, enough water, and enough sunlight to grow into a small plant and finally into a tall, mighty and productive tree. You are now at the start of a certain learning journey that in many ways resembles the growth of a tree. It starts out small and fragile, despite having the potential to grow. Without the right support and without safe and nourishing conditions, it will simply not grow. Now, you may feel a little bit like this seed, suddenly planted into a new world - but each of you has the potential to grow into strong, intelligent and productive woman and this is how I see the role of Bankstown Girls High School and my role as your teacher and year advisor."

To commemorate the journey our Year 7 students are embarking upon, Mr Golestan planted an avocado seed with the assistance of some the BGHS Environmental Team, and, just like our students, we look forward to watching it grow.



The Environmental Team has also had a busy start to the year, both in ensuring our staffrooms are clear of recyclable materials and promoting the care of the school's environment. Their message is clear: Remember to reduce, reuse and recycle. Always put your rubbish in the red bin and recyclables in the yellow bin.

They have also continued to be involved with the What'll Happen to the Wattle project, whereby wattle seeds that were sent to space with the Japanese Space Agency are planted and their growth compared to that of 'normal' wattle seeds. Stay tuned for updates on this Australia-wide citizen science project.

The students have come back to school ready to learn and we are pleased with the progress they have made thus far.

Year 7 have been introduced to the Science lab and have commenced their STEAM Project to *Design and Construct an Orrery*. Year 8 have started with a Chemistry subject and have recently performed an assessable group research task looking at the effect of the concentration of sugar on the production of carbon dioxide by yeast.



The last semester of 2021, which was spent largely working online, has prepared our students for becoming more independent learners. This has been evident in the willingness of students to engage effectively with their work posted online when they are absent from school and during classroom tasks. We have noticed a improvement in the digital literacy of our students this year. Many of our assessments in science, such as the Year 10 Student Individual Research task and the Year 12 Biology Depth study, are being submitted and marked via Google Classroom using a bespoke marking rubric. This will help prepare our students for the rigours of university and other work environments where communicating via a digital medium is required.

Our resident Professor, Wilhelmina Van Rooy, joins our senior biology and investigating science students two days a week as a part of the Covid tutoring program.



Professor Van Rooy brings to a wealth of experience to Bankstown Girls High School, being a senior HSC examiner and writer in both Biology Investigating Science. She also extensive experience in the university sector with primary and secondary educators. A former science teacher herself, she is committed to a targeted approach in assisting the students developing their science skills. An analysis of past HSC performance in Sciences at Girls Bankstown High School require demonstrated our students assistance in their ability to analyse and interpret data in different formats and within new contexts, which has become the prime focus of Professor Van Rooy's tutoring. The Year 12s love having Professor Van Rooy around and she is an amazing resource for our senior science students.


