It has been a whirlwind four weeks since I have taken on the role of relieving principal here at Bankstown Girls High School! I feel very privileged to have been entrusted with leading the passionate and motivated team of teachers and non-teaching staff who work hard every day to support your daughters to strive towards their personal bests inside the classroom and out. Thank you to our students, who have greeted me in the playground and in classrooms, and to the parents and carers who I have met so far, for your warm welcome to the school. I am very much looking forward to working with you in partnership to ensure that your daughters experience the best educational opportunities possible here at BGHS.

<u>Our school plan</u>

The focus areas of our Strategic Improvement Plan continue into 2023, and are:

- Literacy, numeracy and HSC growth
- Student wellbeing, belonging and attendance
- Community and parent/carer engagement
- Quality assessment and feedback
- Teacher innovation and collaboration

Our staff continue to work towards the achievement of these goals. We have strong literacy and numeracy initiatives in place, led by our English and Mathematics faculties.



This year, all teachers are taking part in instructional rounds, which involve observing each other's lessons and identifying patterns of learning across the school as we work hard to continue to improve our practice to maximise learning for our students.

In the 2022 HSC, average results remained higher than our similar schools group, and we continue to focus on growth for all students.

Attendance and lateness

In addition to wellbeing, we are working hard to support strong attendance patterns for our students, in line with the department's attendance policy, and this will be an ongoing focus throughout the year.

Please remember that every day, and every minute, missed of school has an impact on your daughter's learning, and her ability to achieve to her potential.

Lateness to school has become a serious issue for many of our girls, even for our senior students, and this can have a negative impact on their HSC performance. Did you know that 30 minutes missed each day adds up to 18 days of school missed over the year? All students need to be at school from 8:45am each morning, and late students are required to come through the front office with a note from a parent or carer explaining why your daughter is late.

Term 2 is a fresh start, so we'd appreciate your support in ensuring that your daughters can arrive to school on time and ready to learn as we launch into our learning again next term

Wellbeing support

This term we have welcomed Fiona Banbas as our new Head Teacher Wellbeing, who leads our wellbeing team of year advisors and school counsellors to support your daughters to feel safe, welcome and confident at school. Please have a read of the wellbeing section of the newsletter for updates from Fiona and our year advisors about wellbeing supports in 2023.

<u>Student leadership</u>

We welcomed our new Year 7 SRC members to the team this term, and our senior student leaders have been engaging in leadership development this term, supported by our SRC Coordinator and Head Teacher Science Anna Edwards – I look forward to seeing their leadership skills develop throughout their time at BGHS, and am looking forward to their next event, which is the Mother's Day stall on Friday 12 May.

<u>Sorry Day</u>

On Friday 26 May, we will host a Sorry Day event organised by Aunty Lyn and the local AECG to remember the stolen generations and work towards reconciliation. This is a particularly important event given the recent introduction of legislation about the First Nations Voice to Parliament to be decided at a referendum later in the year. Our students will speak about what reconciliation means to them, and we will have the opportunity to hear about the experiences of local elders.

Middle School and High Potential and Gifted Education

This year, we will continue to grow our middle school initiative, working with our local primary schools to provide the best possible transition from primary school to high school, and we are working hard on our High Potential and Gifted Education program to expand opportunities for high potential students. We have reached the end of another busy term and I would like to take the opportunity to thank Lisa Carmody who sat in my seat for part of this term while I was on leave for three weeks. I appreciate the care and consideration she had for all the girls I look after.

Year 12 underwent the Head Teacher checkpoint this term in week 6. This involved all of the girls meeting with the Head Teachers of the courses they study. In that interview they discuss their coursework and attendance in their courses. They girls need to produce samples of their coursework for the Head Teachers to examine. Students who were able to successfully demonstrate they are keeping up with their coursework were sent home a letter of congratulation and those who had work missing were sent home N-Warning Awards letters for Students who we have coursework. concerns for their attendance were also sent a letter to highlight this. If you would like to discuss your daughters progress, please feel free to give me a call on 9709 6788.

You will be aware that the NAPLAN testing has been moved on the calendar and was held in March this year. This will allow schools to get the test results back much earlier than previous years and help us with planning for teaching that goes on in the classroom. The girls sat tests in Reading, Writing, Conventions of Language and Numeracy. We had an extremely successful year with almost all of the girls completing their tests. All students in Years 10 to 12 are required to complete minimum standard tests in reading, writing and numeracy in order to qualify for the award of a Higher School Certificate at the end of Year 12.

The girls are given four attempts each year to reach a minimum standard. Year 10 will be undertaking their minimum standard tests early next term. These comprise of


- a reading test of 45 multiple choice questions that they need to complete in 45 minutes
- a numeracy test is similar with 45 multiple choice questions to be completed in 45 minutes
- a writing test where the girls need to write a specified text type of less than 500 words in 45 minutes.

The girls are given a two pieces of stimulus material as the basis of an idea for their writing.

More information will be presented to the girls in the first two weeks of Term 2.

Students in Year 11 and Year 12 who still need to reach the minimum standards in one or more tests will have an opportunity to do this from mid Term 2.

I hope that everyone has a safe and restful break and see you all back next term.



Attendance Matters

We want to work with you to improve attendance, as every minute missed is a learning opportunity missed. Please note the following:

- The NSW Department of Education expects every student to attend school on time, every day.
- Your daughter's learning is negatively impacted every time she is absent from school for a day, or part of a day.
- All full day absences must be explained by contacting the school via phone, email, SMS reply, through the Sentral Parent Portal, or sending in a signed note with your daughter.
- Lateness is a form of absence. All lateness must be explained, as above.
- If your daughter's attendance drops below satisfactory levels, we will communicate with you to discuss a plan to improve attendance.
- Please log into the Sentral Parent Portal and check your daughter's attendance. You will see an overall percentage absence. Any attendance level under 90% is cause for concern.
- You may use the Sentral Parent Portal to explain any unexplained absences. All Term 1 absences should be explained by the start of Term 2.

Uniform for Safety and Wellbeing

We require students to follow our uniform code for safety and wellbeing reasons. Please note the following:

• If students are out of uniform they should bring a note from home explaining the reason and present this to their ELP teachers to request a uniform pass.

Uniform must include:

- A school shirt
- A school skirt or trousers
- Black leather enclosed school shoes (for safety in science labs and TAS classes)
- If a jumper is worn, it must be the school jumper or jacket.

<u>Unacceptable items include:</u>

- Hoodies
- Other t-shirts
- Wearing no shirt with a jumpers/jacket over the top

• Sports uniform (this is only to be worn during sport/PDHPE

periods) – girls must change into sports uniform at school

• Any shoes that are not black leather school shoes

Mobile phone policy

• Mobile phones must be switched off and in bags during the school day.

• Mobile phones will be confiscated by teachers and taken to the Deputy Principals if they are used by students without permission.

• Airpods and earphones are not permitted at any time and may be confiscated.

• Any confiscated items may only be collected at the end of the school day.

• Repeated breaches of the mobile phone policy will lead to parent interview and parent collection of devices from the school.

The English Faculty has had a creative and productive start to 2023. Both teachers and students have been learning about novels, poetry, Shakespeare, reading, writing and of course... learning about each other.

Year 7 have been studying the novel *Coraline*. We have been analysing themes and characters as well as learning how we can make our creative writing better. We are also being very careful of some doors around the school. We don't want to find ourselves entering into a portal to another world (wink wink).

Year 8 have been undertaking a novel study as well, however, they are learning to write their first academic essay. They are learning to structure their ideas using P.E.E.L paragraphs and argue the value of the themes and characters in their different novels.

Both Year 7 and 8 students have used the S.L.A.P cards in class, making sure they understand the purpose of writing and the audience they are writing for.



Year 9 have been studying a comparison of texts across time. Some classes are looking at the evolution of the vampire, whilst others are exploring how fairytales have been appropriated through time.

Mathematics

The Mathematics faculty welcomed back our dedicated staff: Mrs Rounis, Mr Mustapha, Mr Yilmazlar, Ms Doai, Ms Weston, Ms Wang and Ms Newman.

We launched our in-class support with Mrs Saisanas, Mr Yilmazlar and Mrs Rounis. Our lunchtime tutoring sessions with Ms Wang, which were a huge success in 2022, are continuing this year with a change of days. Lunchtime sessions are now held every Tuesday and Wednesday.

The 'Numeracy in Mathematics' program for Term 1 is based around skill development with the use of Mathletics and the Smarter Maths online programs.

We encourage all students to utilise these programs to support their learning in the junior school. Our senior students have been provided with access to Atomi which offers self-paced learning modules.

Continuing the numeracy theme; Mrs Rounis has been working with Ms Kyritsis and the HSIE teachers in History, Commerce and Retail. Ms Singh and Mrs Rounis are working with Stage 4 and 5 and focusing on Measurement. Both programs are providing students with the necessary skills to apply mathematics in the context of Science and HSIE.



9 **STEAM-Robotics** Our Year program Ms and commenced with Doai the Mathematics teachers focusing on skilling our students in robotics. We envisage that several groups of students will have the opportunity to take part in the URC Robotics challenge at the end of the year.

What we are doing in the classroom?

In Mathematics we try to extend our students to be creative in solving problems and producing high quality work.

In Year 7, students explored Integers and completed their first problem solving assignment. One of the sections required students to "Write a 100-word story about the adventures of the number 2. Your story must include the concepts of addition, subtraction, multiplication and division." Some interesting pieces of work have been produced and will be included in our next edition of Candid, as the assignment has yet to be finalised.

Year 8 students worked on Financial Mathematics and Pythagoras' Theorem. Both topics have real world applications which our students explored.

Our year 9 cohort have worked on Indices and concentrated on building their basic numeracy skills in preparation for NAPLAN. They have also completed their first takehome numeracy assignment.

Year 10, students were challenged with working with compound interest, buying items on terms and justifying their choice of purchasing.

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Student Sample Students were required to complete these calculations and then choose the most appropriate option using reasoning and mathematical justifications

Meanwhile, Year 12 students were immersed in their investigative tasks in all three courses. The Standard course students explored networks and their implications, while the Advanced course put into practice their statistical skills. The Extension 1 class had to develop a drinking capsule given a set of constraints.

What next?


The Mathematics faculty has a range of activities planned for our students to support their learning. The most vital aspect of the study of mathematics is how and when to apply skills in context. The problem-solving component of working mathematically remains a focus for our practice, providing students with real-world examples of mathematics in action. Numeracy days organised by the faculty will run in the next couple of terms, and have been a huge success in the past.

The 2022 Robotics report is included in this first edition of Candid as it is the first opportunity that we have had to celebrate the successes of our students from 2022.

I would like to express my appreciation to Ms Doai for her contributions and commitment to this program and thank her for the brilliant and unwavering support of our students.

Year 8 and Year 9 students worked after school, and during the robotics periods in Term 2, 3 and 4 to complete their robots ready for the Universal Robotics Challenge (URC 2022). The mission was related to Agriculture Technology; design and code a robot that could plant six seeds on the field in the shortest time possible.

Our school had seven teams compete and we were triumphant!



The girls worked tirelessly, especially on the day of competition. There were constant battery changes, practice runs, failed robotic parts that needed replacing, changes in codes and lots of nerves.

The first team up were Hanna Ramini and Amina Kamran, they demonstrated team work at its finest. I couldn't have felt more proud watching the first team succeed in completing the challenge smoothly and well-coordinated.

The second team were the Year 9 group: Yelleina Alabaso, Yin Yin Le and Kimmy Tran. Calm prevailed as they breezed through their round. They knew their roles and responsibilities and were moving through the two rounds without a hitch. They achieved their personal best time and, oh my days, did they celebrate. It was so close. I second off for 2nd place.

"Our group really enjoyed the progression of our robot and our skills in coding. Even through the ups and downs and all the trial and error, we never once lost hope or stopped trying to achieve our goal of making it to Japan. On the day we were able to get a record time of 41 seconds.

During that short moment of seeing our time on the screen we felt a bliss of euphoria and joy but was shortly broken as we overheard another group of students talking about other groups getting a time of 40 seconds and below. We felt doubtful and scared that we wouldn't even have a chance on the podium. Not only that but we were hungry, thirsty and exhausted because of the long and constant practice of our coding and routine before the actual competition had actually begun." Yelleina.

Year 7 Geography

Term 1, 2023 has been a great journey so far for our Year 7 Geography students who have settled well into their learning and have displayed great enthusiasm! During weeks one to six students successfully completed their Geography orientation program which introduced them to the study of What is Geography? and various numeracy and geographical skills.



Moving forward students have commenced their new unit of work 'Landscapes and Landforms", using examples from Australia and throughout the world! Year 7 have also been in the process of a completing their Multimedia assessment tasks in collaboration with their peers, focusing on a chosen landform and examining it's uniqueness and also applying the concepts of BOLTSS and SPICESS. Overall, students have demonstrated an excellent effort in term 1 and we look forward to seeing their progress in the year ahead!



Year 8 Geography

In stage 4, History, our students are critically analysing new historical terms and concepts in order to understand and investigate essential yet challenging historical times. They are using questioning skills to incorporate the study of the nature of History and historical sources, both archaeological and written. Students explore ancient history from the earliest human communities to the end of the Ancient period.

While they study these concepts, the learning journey in Term 1 also includes an investigation of the ancient past and learning about ancient

Greece.

Year 9 Geography have been busy investigating sustainable biomes and

environmental change and management this term. The students have looked closely at the productivity of biomes, their role in global food security levels, and the need to sustainably manage them for the future. Students have applied their knowledge through case studies, such as the use of palm oil, and have compared environmental issues occurring in the marine biome- the Great Barrier Reef and Indonesia. Students have put their numeracy skills into action, by using latitude and longitude to locate biomes, and have graphed the expected climate for them, through climate graphs. All of this will prepare them for their

upcoming STEAM-based assessment task - Project Global.

In Stage 5 History, we are extending our students to look at the past with a critical lens. Studying History, enables us to better understand the world in which


we live. Building knowledge and understanding of historical events and trends, enables students to develop a greater appreciation for present day society.

> Year 10 is currently studying "The movement of people", focusing on the slave trade and its lasting impact on society. The students have been learning to apply source analysis skills to extrapolate information relevant to the unit of study. Working in pairs, the girls have applied the source analysis principles (TOPMACRU) to their assessment task, where they have selected, analysed, and curated a virtual museum exhibition that highlights the nature of the Slave Trade and its lasting impact on society. The girls have been using their ICT skills across different digital platforms including Artsteps and Minecraft, to produce an interactive exhibition that is both informative and engaging.









Science

Focus on Stage 6

The Science faculty is keen to inspire Australia's future female scientists and, pleasingly, several Year 11 and Year 12 Students have chosen to undertake 3 Science subjects, which is the maximum allowable, during their senior years of study. The following quotes* reflect our Year 11 students' experiences of Term 1 in Science. The faculty is excited by our students' progress in their courses this year and look forward to helping them achieve their best (and become Australia's next female Nobel Prize recipient for Physics, Chemistry, or Medicine and Physiology).

Hiba Kazi: "Chemistry is hard to understand at time but is easy when you spend the time to understand it. Biology is easy and allows me to work at a slower pace. Physics is hard and needs practice for perfection – which I need to work on".

Manhoor Khan: "I struggled in Chemistry at first, as I wasn't prepared for the pace of the course and the workload. Particularly with concept of gravimetric analysis, and I fell behind in my work. However, I've worked hard and am on top of everything. I achieved a great result of 94% in my first assessment task and am so proud of myself for bouncing back. Physics has been challenging - the problem is knowing how to piece all those concepts together to effectively answer a complex question. Investigating Science is a course where I'm confident I will do well in. The content seems easy, but through continuously dissecting simple, selfexplanatory processes a lot, it can become a lot to handle."

As senior science teachers, our focus is on ensuring that our students have the skills to enable them to apply their knowledge in new and unfamiliar contexts, which is required if students wish to achieve Bands 5 & 6 in the HSC. Fortunately, these skills are taught explicitly in the Stage 6 Investigating Science course. We are very excited by the fantastic start Year 11 students have made in their Science courses and encourage them all to keep up the good work and ask their teacher for assistance if needed. Attending the Biology tutoring sessions Thursday morning at 8am and on Investigating Science at 8am on Friday mornings will also assist making connections and developing exam skills. Keep up the great work Year 11.



<u>Year 12 Biology – Museum of Human</u> <u>Disease excursion</u>

Both Year 12 Biology classes attended the Museum of Human Disease to participate in two workshops that cover aspects of all four Year 12 Modules in the HSC Biology course. The students were very engaged and enjoyed the hands-on activities. The disease includes hundreds of real human disease specimens, and the girls were fascinated with the effect both infectious and non-infectious diseases can have on our body.



The museum is housed within the University of New South Wales. This gave the girls the opportunity to travel via public transport and know that they'll be more than capable of doing the same by themselves next year when they go to university themselves!



Upcoming incursions

Thanks to Mr Golestan we have a couple of exciting excursions planned for late this term – a visit from a genetic counsellor who will explain the role and some of the conditions that are commonly identified for counselling. This will assist our Year 10 Students who have recently completed a topic on genetics, as well as our Year 12 Biology students, who look at genetically inherited non-infectious diseases as part of the HSC course.

The second incursion will be a whole school opportunity to listen to one of Australia's great science communicators, Dr Karl Kruszelnicki. Karl popularises science on ABC radio stations across Australia and, on the BBC, for several hours each week. He has written (so far) 47 books, beginning with 'Great Moments In Science' in 1984, and includes such titles as 'It Ain't Necessarily So...'Bro' (2006), which was launched, quite literally, via rocket at Sydney's Bondi Beach (a world first).

This will be a brilliant event that will happen on 15 May in Term 2. Suffice to say, the Science Faculty is super excited for Dr Karl!

In 2018 our then-Year 7 would have started high school with trepidation about the journey ahead. What seemed then like an impossible idea, is now a reality. Year 12 are now world-weary seniors, standing on the precipice of the world that lies ahead of them, making a new impossibility seem possible.

What is bullying?

Bullying is when someone with more power than you deliberately and repeatedly tries to upset or hurt you. It can involve one or more of the following:

- the misuse of power in a relationship
- is intentional, ongoing and repeated.
- behaviours that can cause harm.

Bullying can be physical, verbal, or social. Bullying can be easy to see (overt) or hidden (covert) Cyberbullying is online bullying that involves the use of technology such as the internet or mobile devices.

I've seen someone bullied

Have you seen bullying happen but didn't know how to stop it? There are things you can do. Don't put your own safety at risk. Step in only if you feel safe to do so.

Who are bystanders?

Bystanders are people who watch or are nearby at the time the bullying takes place. You can be a bystander in person or online.

You may have been a bystander if you have:

- stood and watched in silence
- seen bullying happening online and said nothing
- laughed or walked away from the situation
- cheered or encouraged the person bullying
- forwarded an offensive image, post or text message to someone.

Who are upstanders?

An upstander is someone who offers support to the person being bullied.

What can I do?

If you see bullying and feel confident enough to take safe action, there's a bigger chance that the bullying will stop. You can use words or actions to help someone who is being bullied. This is called being an upstander.

A group of students standing up to bullying together helps everyone to stay safe.



Say or write something supportive to the person being bullied

For example:

- "Do you want me to come with you to the office to tell a teacher about this?"
- "I know you must feel pretty bad but they're the one with the problem."
- "Just ignore what they said. They're doing it to feel better about themselves."

Do something to help the person being bullied You could:

- take them away from the person doing the bullying.
- encourage them to ask for help, for example go with them to get help.
- include them in your group and introduce them to your friends.
- suggest safe places for them to go.
- show them how to set their privacy settings on social networking sites and mobile devices.
- Avoid joining in
- Don't behave in ways that make the problem worse, such as:
- joining in with harassing or hurting someone.
- reinforcing the bullying behaviour by encouraging, cheering and laughing, even if it's from a distance or when you hear about it later.
- resending or responding to messages or photos that may be offensive or upsetting to someone.
- harassing, teasing or spreading gossip about others on social media.

Tell someone

If someone is being hurt, it's important to seek help.

If you're worried about what other people will say, tell someone else privately.

Even if the bullying happens outside of school, report it to someone who can help or someone you trust such as:

- the media platform
- your parents or someone in your family
- a teacher or a school counsellor or psychologist
- the police, if the bullying is causing serious harm
- to the The eSafety Commissioner if it is serious bullying online.

Year 8 French



In addition, they have learned how to name family members and identify parts of the human body. They transferred this knowledge and created some artistic and imaginative art works to grace our classroom walls.














VET

• Prepare beverages and apply the principles of hygiene and food safety.



Over four days during Term 1, nine students were given the opportunity to participate in the PCYC – Stepping Up Work Readiness program. The aim of the program was to provide the students with the opportunity to participate in work related practical sessions gaining transferable job ready skills to assist them with their post-school planning.

During the four days of the program the students explored career opportunities and developed skills to better prepare them for job interviews and entering the workforce. The girls also completed their First Aid and White Card and on successful completion of the course the students received nationally recognised Statements of Attainment which will be most valuable when entering the workforce.

My role as Transition Adviser is to promote the active engagement and retention of students who may be experiencing difficulty in the school environment. I also aim to help guide and facilitate a successful transition from school to alternative study or employment for those students who are not aspiring to complete their HSC and have a strong sense of direction for their future career pathway.
